Faculty Spotlight: Dr. Kyra Whitehead

Part of the purpose of this newsletter is to help faculty get to know each other and to celebrate each other's accomplishments, projects, and work. We've decided to start a new **Faculty Spotlight** section, and we're kicking it off with Dr. Kyra Whitehead.

Kyra is an alumna of Drew University's Caspersen School of Graduate Studies, through which she completed her D.Litt, Doctoral degree in Global Studies, and received a graduate certificate in conflict resolution and leadership. She defended her dissertation in 2019, with a dissertation conducted at WKU. Her research works to establish an environment of peacebuilding in ESL classrooms by emphasizing the intercultural exchange of stories told through literature and the arts.

Here at WKU, Kyra specializes in teaching English for Academic Purposes (EAP), with a primary focus in Design. She has proven so valuable in that position, especially to Michael Graves College of Architecture and Design, that she's basically a member of that college too. She has grown into this position while working as the EAP Specialist for Design at WKU, she formerly served as the English Language Program Dean for Concordia Language Villages.

Working in partnership with faculty, staff, and students in Design, Kyra has written course materials for both the English and Design departments that offer the core of ESL teaching to a student body in need of specialized language learning. These materials include everything from vocabulary lists and lesson plans to activities and Powerpoint presentations, and are available to English faculty on request. She's also offering to conduct classroom workshops!

Topics include things like branding and advertising, color theory, storytelling and design, culture and design, finding descriptive language for design, and much more!

In addition to teaching ESL courses, Kyra also began teaching DSN 1100, Introduction to Design and Visual Culture, and a design-specific GE 2025 Research and Technology, where she continues to refine her pedagogical skills.
